The course will explore the social forces that affect law and conversely how laws affect society. The course will cover the ongoing global changes in legal systems with a concentration on the American legal system. The internet and other technological advances have created great changes in our society. The American legal system is also undergoing a revolutionary transition from a strict adversarial mode to alternative forms of dispute resolution. How have social forces expedited this transition? The course will also examine theories and current research as to the law and social control; the law and social change; and the relationship among the participants in the legal system. In addition, the course will explore the dynamics, functions and dysfunctions of the law and how various social groups are affected by these dynamics and its effect upon our society.
