The sociomental partitioning of the past: history as a classification system, the social construction of historical "periods", historical assimilation and differentiation, mnemonic inflation and compression, historical voids, the politics of periodization; the social punctuation of the past: staccato narratives, historical "watersheds"; identity transformation, rites of passage, social death and rebirth
